
Economic Lifecycles in Africa


- Variations in economic lifecycles in Africa

- Production by young adults and the elderly in Africa is important, largely due to large informal sector.















Education in Africa


- The public sector plays an important role in providing education in Africa (except for Nigeria)
- The family provides larger support for the upper secondary level and higher education















Health Consumption in Africa


- The family plays an important role in providing health care in Africa
- The public sector needs to provide larger support for health care in some countries, especially to children and the elderly

- However, public health consumption is low
